



Bachelor of Arts in English **(Offered by Georgian Court University at Hazlet) revised December 26, 2018**

English Admission Requirements:

-Completion of a Humanities – English Option A.A. degree is preferred.

-Completion of:

- ENGL121 and 122
- ENGL231, 232, 235, 236, 245 or 246
- The following courses must eventually be completed and if they have not been completed by the time of admission, students may not be able to graduate on schedule: ENGL275, AND four from among the following: ENGL155 (Short Story), ENGL156 (Intro to Poetry), ENGL158 (Intro to Lit), ENGL168 (Contemporary Plays), ENGL175 (Woman as Author), ENGL206 (Approaches to Literary Studies), ENGL221 (Creative Writing), ENGL231 (British Lit I), ENGL232 (British Lit II), ENGL235 (World Lit I), ENGL236 (World Lit II), ENGL245 (American Lit I), ENGL246 (American Lit II), ENGL265 (Children's Lit), ENGL266 (Young Adult Lit). One of the four may be from among ENGL223 (Poetry Writing Wkshp), ENGL224 (Fiction Writing Wkshp), ENGL225 (Technical Writing), or ENGL227 (Creative Non-Fiction Wkshp).

-2.00 minimum cumulative GPA (from all previous colleges attended).

-Note: Issues in Women's Studies (HUMN129) and Introduction to Ethics (PHIL227) must eventually be taken, unless students plan to take the GCU equivalents through GCU Lakewood (face-to-face, or online if offered).

*** Students who have Brookdale courses left in their program will need to pay Brookdale directly for the courses unless students take the courses through the GCU@ Hazlet Course Exchange Consortium Agreement. Financial aid will be awarded and paid to students for GCU courses only unless students take Brookdale courses through the GCU@Hazlet Course Exchange Consortium Agreement.**

Dual Admission

Brookdale Community College and Georgian Court University have partnered together to offer Dual Admissions for BCC students. Dual Admissions allows a BCC student to apply and be admitted to GCU as early as their first semester at BCC. You must apply prior to your last semester at Brookdale. Highlights of this agreement include:

1. Application fee to GCU is waived
2. Guaranteed admission to GCU provided you meet all entrance requirements
3. Your classes at Brookdale will satisfy GCU general education and other bachelor's degree course requirements as outlined in the Dual Admissions Agreement
4. Meetings with Georgian Court University faculty and advisors early and often to ensure a seamless transition and transfer of credits
5. Graduation requirements will not change based on the academic year you are accepted for dual admissions (certain restrictions apply)

6. Your BCC transcripts are automatically sent to GCU from Brookdale, at no charge

Next Steps to Apply to this GCU Hazlet Bachelor's Degree Program (all students, including dual admission students, should follow these steps):

1. Apply to GCU online (www.georgian.edu/hazlet) or by submitting a paper application available at the Hazlet Campus
2. Submit your official transcripts from all colleges or universities attended (note: for dual admit students, Brookdale transcripts are sent automatically to GCU by Brookdale). If you plan to be an Education Major at GCU, you must also submit Praxis Core, SAT, ACT, or GRE scores, Praxis II Multiple Subjects Exam for Elementary Educators scores, and two completed Teacher Education Recommendation Forms (www.georgian.edu/admissions/transfer) to GCU. See admissions office for details.
3. Accepted students will receive notification within 72 hours of receiving the application and all supplemental documents. A Preliminary Transfer Credit Evaluation will be completed by GCU and sent to you.
4. Confirm your enrollment by submitting your enrollment deposit of \$250 during your last semester at BCC.
5. Submit your FAFSA. The GCU School Code is 002608.
6. Attend a Registration Night during your last semester at BCC to meet with a Faculty Academic Advisor to review your Progress Chart and discuss course selection. You will sign up for GCU classes at this event.

Structure of GCU English Part of Program:

The English major requires 39 credit hours of English courses, of which 24 credits are taken in eight three-credit courses as follows: 1) EN300 An Introduction to Literary Study (a foundational course focusing on research in English and basic literary theory), 2) upper-level Period Courses in Literature, one in each of five areas: Anglo-Saxon and Medieval, Renaissance (should be Brookdale's ENGL275), British, American, and Multi-ethnic, 3) EN429 and 430, which are capstone seminar courses that provide an overview of all literature written in English and discussion of specific works not covered in other courses, with a second-semester concentration on twentieth-century Britain.

-The rest of the 15 credits are English electives. All English electives may be taken at Brookdale Community College, as can the required Renaissance Literature (satisfied by Brookdale's ENGL275 Shakespeare's Plays).
- In addition to the 39 credits of required courses, students take Brookdale's ENGL121 and 122 (English Composition I and II).

English majors develop skills that businesses, other employers, and graduate schools want: the ability to write and speak well, to read and interpret complex material, and to explain difficult concepts in comprehensible terms. They begin to apply and test those skills through internships and in collaborative research with faculty members. Graduates have followed diverse career paths to become lawyers, technology specialists, account supervisors, journalists, librarians, teachers, college professors, educational administrators, and more.

Structure of Rest of the GCU Part of the Program:

Effective Fall 2016, graduates of an accredited New Jersey community college who have earned an associate degree with a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 and have completed the general education requirements established in the statewide agreement will transfer those general education credits in full to satisfy a minimum of 45 (A.A.), 30 (A.S.), or 20 (other associate degree) credits of the Georgian Court General Education Requirements. Only courses in which a grade of "C" or higher has been achieved are eligible for transfer. Courses transferred as part of the community college's general education program that have Georgian Court University general education equivalents will be transferred as those equivalent courses. Other general education courses required by the community college will be transferred as general education electives. If an equivalency is not transferred, all four of the following general education requirements must be fulfilled: a designated Religious Studies course, a designated Women and Gender Studies course (BCC's HUMN129 fulfills the requirement), a designated Ethics course (BCC's PHIL227 fulfills the requirement), and the Capstone course (GEN400). The GCU Experiential Learning requirement must be fulfilled as follows: 1) GEN400, which includes a service learning project completed, and 2) a service learning project completed in a course other than GEN101 or GEN400, an internship/practicum/field placement, or an approved education abroad experience.

Tuition:

\$510/credit for 2018-2019. No general fees are charged.

Degree FAQ:

How many credits can I transfer to this program?

Georgian Court University will accept all Brookdale courses listed as requirements on the Hazlet English degree plan plus Brookdale requirements that are not part of the degree plan [e.g., Oral Communications course]. Remaining required course work must be completed through Georgian Court. Georgian Court will accept up to 75 credits from Brookdale or other community colleges. Up to 15 additional credits will be accepted from 4-year institutions. At least 30 credits must be earned at Georgian Court, including at least 21 credits in the English major.

How many credits are required?

Students must earn a minimum of 120 credits to meet requirements for the BA in English.

Can I attend courses at the Lakewood campus as well?

Yes, if the courses are approved by your advisor. Some restrictions apply. Please consult the policy entitled "Students taking courses at an enrollment location other than their own" in the GCU catalog at <http://georgian.edu/publications/>.

Once enrolled in this degree program, can I take any Brookdale classes to count towards this degree?

Yes, if the courses are needed to complete your degree requirements and are approved by your Georgian Court advisor. Students who have Brookdale courses left in their program will need to pay Brookdale directly for the courses unless students take the courses through the GCU@ Hazlet Course Exchange Consortium Agreement. Financial aid will be awarded and paid to students for GCU courses only unless students take Brookdale courses through the GCU@Hazlet Course Exchange Consortium Agreement.

^ Required course. All other courses listed are recommended but not required but see note below. British Lit and American Lit are 300/400 level specialized courses, not equivalent to BCC's ENGL231,232,245,246. Please note that student's financial aid status may be adversely affected by not taking a full-time (or part-time, depending on type of aid) load of GCU credits.

In order to be a full-time student for financial aid purposes when enrolled in a GCU Hazlet program, undergraduate students will need to be enrolled in at least 12 GCU credits. Students who have completed appropriate course prerequisites may choose to take courses offered at Hazlet in a different GCU program. Otherwise, students may take GCU online or Lakewood courses at the Hazlet tuition rate. Students who have Brookdale courses left in their program will need to pay Brookdale directly for the courses unless students take the courses through the GCU@Hazlet Course Exchange Consortium Agreement. Financial aid will be awarded and paid to students for GCU courses only, unless students take Brookdale courses through the GCU@Hazlet Course Exchange Consortium Agreement. See separate Course Exchange Consortium Agreement documents for more information. Advising notes for students:

1. Students do not have to have taken all transferable credits prior to entry into the bachelor's degree program. HOWEVER, all requirements listed in this handout and the GCU catalog MUST eventually be completed (please note in particular the required Brookdale English and gen ed courses, and GCU requirements for experiential learning). Students must earn at least 30 credits from GCU to graduate, even if the program of courses offered face-to-face at Hazlet does not total 30 credits. The student's GCU Registrar-issued Progress Chart shows which requirements have or have not been completed.
2. The program is designed for students taking a part-time schedule of GCU courses through GCU Hazlet, but students may enroll full-time by taking GCU Lakewood online or face-to-face courses, or Brookdale courses through the Course Exchange Consortium Agreement. Students not following the published cohort schedule in its entirety should realize that they may experience some course conflicts. GCU is not responsible for resolving such conflicts.
3. Questions about financial aid should be referred to the GCU financial aid office (732.987.2258 – please identify yourself as a Hazlet student).
4. Some courses may be offered in online mode only. GCU attempts to offer courses on no more than two days per week but cannot guarantee that the courses will be offered on only two days per week or that the days per week will not change from semester to semester.
5. Students should have completed ENGL121, 122 and 275 prior to enrolling in any GCU English course.
6. Students must complete ENGL231, 232, 235, 236, 245 or 246 prior to enrolling in any GCU English course.
7. Senior status within the English major is required before enrolling in EN429 and EN430.
8. Hazlet students must earn at least 48 GCU credits graded A-F to be eligible for degree honors.
